Located on the front of the historic Trinity Church in Boston are the sculptures of six men. At the center are four Gospel writers who are flanked on the right by Paul and on the left by Isaiah. Isaiah's presence in this distinguished cloud of witnesses speaks volumes about his importance for the church.

Jerome (c. 342–420) wrote of Isaiah, "He should be called an evangelist rather than a prophet because he describes all the mysteries of Christ and the Church so clearly that you think he is composing a history of what has already happened rather than prophesying about what is to come."

Likewise, when Augustine (c. 345–430) asked Ambrose (c.327–400) for his advice on what he should read, the latter suggested Isaiah, "Because, I believe, he is more plainly a foreteller of the Gospel and of the calling of the Gentiles than are the others." Isaiah is one of the most significant books in the Bible.

That's all that is needed to decide on Isaiah as our Advent weekends and Christmas Eve guide. For its grandeur, majesty, and supreme artistry, we'll be reading, marking, learning and inwardly digesting Isaiah 40:1-11. These eleven verses with their soaring language and unforgettable imagery are tightly woven into the fabric of the season's hymns and liturgy.

With the theme of "Savior of the Nations Come," here are the Advent weekends and Christmas Eve messages:

Nov 30/Dec 1 | Comfort, Comfort Ye My People (Isaiah 40:1–2)

Dec 7/8 | Prepare the Royal Highway (Isaiah 40:3–5)

Dec 14/15 | Hark the Glad Sound (Isaiah 40:6-8)

Dec 21/22 | O Come, O Come Emmanuel (Isaiah 40:9)

Christmas Eve 3pm Contemporary and 5pm Traditional | Joy to the World (Isaiah 40:10–11)

Midweek Advent Services will be held in the Chapel on Wednesdays at 5pm. With the theme of "When Heaven Met Earth: Advent Answers to Hard Questions Hardly Anybody Is Asking," here are the Wednesday Advent messages:

Dec 4 | The Birth of God: How . . . and Why? (Luke 1:26–38)

Dec 11 | The Obedient Child: Did He Know? (Luke 2:41-52)

Dec 18 | The Man's Man: Why Would Jesus Ever Cry? (Luke19:41-44; John 11:30-36)



## **School Choice Update**

In anticipation of a decision being made at the Annual Voters' Assembly in May 2025 regarding participation in the Wisconsin Parental Choice Program, School Choice Wisconsin staff will again be invited to present and answer questions at an upcoming Town Hall Meeting. This meeting will occur at a date and time yet to be determined during the first quarter of 2025. If the measure passes, the soonest the Day School would become a participant would be the 2026-2027 school year.

Beginning with this month's Rejoice! and upcoming monthly newsletters we'll be featuring School Choice FAQ's. We welcome all questions. Questions can be submitted to Principal Jill Helgerson or to Pastor Chris. Here's this month's question:

Can parents opt their children out of religious instruction and activities?

Parents can choose to opt their children out of formal religious instruction and worship; however, most schools do not receive such requests. Religious schools should remain true to their mission and culture, and they may continue to inspire their curriculum with the teachings and values of their faith. Schools may display symbols of their faith in hallways and classrooms, pray together at the beginning of class or before meals, and all other actions that affirm their belief and traditions.

# Serving the Lord in Riga, Latvia

### News from the Bobby Family

Greetings in the Name of Jesus,

I was reading Deuteronomy 31 in my daily devotions the other day, and I was struck by this line of Scripture: "And the Lord said to Moses, "Behold, the days approach when you must die" (Deuteronomy 31:14). I know this statement unfolds within God's commissioning of Joshua, the people of Israel's transition into the Promised Land, and after Moses disobedience. Nevertheless, it's just so matter of fact. I was amazed at how Moses didn't complain, argue, beg, or plead. He knows he can trust in God even in the face of death. He knows he can trust God's will even when that means suffering the inevitable consequences of sin as declared by God back in the Garden of Eden.

Earlier in the chapter, God encourages Joshua by saying, "Be strong and courageous, for you shall go with this people into the land that the Lord has sworn to their fathers to give them, and you shall put them in possession of it. It is the Lord who goes before you. He will be with you; he will not leave you or forsake you. Do not fear or be dismayed" (Deuteronomy 31:7-8). Like Moses and Joshua, God's people can be courageous because God's plans are the only plans that last for eternity, and those plans are ultimately plans of forgiveness, salvation, and restoration. These plans are fully revealed in Jesus, where we see God's will for His people on full display through the death and resurrection of His Son.

I often say that the most difficult petition of the Lord's Prayer to pray is the Third Petition because in it we ask that God's will, not our will, be done. This means truly trusting in God even as we see our own plans diminishing, breaking, or dying. It means trusting God the way Moses does even when facing death. Like Moses, we know the mighty works of God, how He has brought life and light out of death and darkness through His Son. But we, unlike Moses, get to experience that here and now through our Baptisms and through the preaching of God's Word and the Lord's Supper.

On the mission field, it can be easy to forget that the only plans that persist through sin and death are those of our Savior's. As people from all different races, nationalities, and tribes busy themselves with their plans, they need to hear of the One who calls them to trust in Him. They need to know that only Jesus can transform their life of sin and death into His mercy, goodness, and everlasting righteousness.

We continue to instruct and form future pastors here at Luther Academy, pastors who will bring that message of salvation to people all over the Eurasia region and beyond. With classes in full swing, we are already looking toward the spring semester and making plans for those classes. Never a dull moment! I have been thoroughly impressed this semester by our students' faithfulness and practical acumen. In our classes and with their assignments, they are thoughtful, caring, and theologically solid. Praise be to God! Yet, we always pray that God's will, not ours, be done in and through these future pastors and the people they will shepherd.

Thank you so much for your prayers and continued support! We are incredibly grateful and humbled by the zeal you as God's people have for His kingdom!
